Symbol- Object, animal or image that holds meaning in addition to its literal function in the story









A symbol can have a variety meanings...



1. PERSONAL: a meaning uniquely associated with personal experiences



2. CONTEXTUAL: a private meaning created by an author



3. CULTURAL: a meaning uniquely influenced by our current culture

NOTE: personal and cultural lenses may make interpreting symbols (and their intent) difficult! (e.g.: dogs represent <u>faithfulness</u> in China and U.S., but <u>impurity</u> in Indian/South Asian cultures)



4. UNIVERSAL: a meaning that is given to a thing by most people and cultures



(e.g.: lions suggest power and courage in many cultures)







Universally, water represents life and purity, so how we might interpret the use of a polluted river in a story? Going downstream can also represent a journey or acquiring experience, maturation













A piece of writing in which the entire story serves as a SYMBOL

(represents something more or conveys an idea)



Therefore, there are quite a few symbols within the piece






OAnecdote

A short narrative in a work of nonfiction used to prove a point

OAnalogy

Comparison in which an idea or a thing is compared to another thing that is quite different from it.

Found in nonfiction
